### In Memoriam



Bain M. (Tiny) Jones

Bain Morrison (Tiny) Jones, 67, a basketball and football coach in Mt. Sterling for thirty years, died in the Good Samaritan Hospital, Lexington, on January 22, 1968, after a long illness.

Mr. Jones, a native of Kuttawa, was a 1928 graduate of Kentucky Weslevan College at Windhester, where he played basketball and football, being considered one of the best football centers in the state. After college graduation, he came to Mt. Sterling, and athletics at the city school was never the same after that.

Tiny's basketball teams won nine district tournaments, four regional tournaments, finishing third in the state in 1943. The Mt. Sterling Trojans were CKC bas-ketball champions in 1938, 1942, and 1943.

The football teams of Coach Jones, noted for their power, won CKC championships in 1930 and 1931, and were co-champions in 1949.

Tiny also coached and taught at Dayton High School for three years and at Bourbon Vocational High School for one year. The Mit. Sterling city school's athletic field is named in his honor.

The Mt. Sterling Advocate had this to say about Mr. Jones:

"Tiny, who became a legend in his own time, was known from one end of Kentucky to the other. Always young at heart, he never saw a stranger and his last dime was yours if you needed it.

"Tiny was not only a great coach but a good teacher. For years he taught four science subjects and one of his pupils, the late Dr. Louis Gordon, went on to help make the first atom bomb at Oak Ridge. Another who graduated from M.I.T. said he had been well prepared for the tough courses there.

"One of the reasons Tiny was so successful in athletics was his interest in the little fellows still in grade school. They were just as important to him as the var-

sity players.
"We were fortunate to have known a man like Tiny Jones.''

#### Bain M. (Tiny) Jones

Bain Morrison (Tiny) Jones, 67, a basketball and tootball coach in Mt. Sterling for thirty years, died in the Good Samuritan Hospital, Lexington, on Jenuary 22, 1968, after a long illness.

Mr. Jones, a native of Kuttawa, was a 1928 graduate of Kentucky Wesleyen College at Windnester, where he played basketball and football, being considered one of the best football centers in the state. After college gradunation, he came to Mt. Sterling, and athletics at the city school was never the same after that.

Tiny's basketball teams won nine district tournaments, four regional tournaments, finishing third in the state in 1943. The Mt. Sterling Trojans were CKC baskethall champions in 1938, 1942, and 1943.

The football beams of Corch Jones, noted for their power, won CKC championships in 1930 and 1931, and were co-champions in 1949.

Tiny also coached and taught at Dayton High School for three years and at Bourbon Vocational High School for one year. The Mt. Sterling city school's athletic field is named in his honor.

The Mt. Sterling Advocate had this to say about Mr. Jones:

## North Hardin Wins Wrestling Crown

Last summer Ronald Jackson of Seneca High School was looking forward to his third season of wrestling on his school's team when he got his big toe caught in a power mower.

Doctors feared his wrestling career was ended.

But Ronald's toe healed nicely, and last night at Westport High Gym he

Ronald followed the same routine be-fore last night's match that he does before all of his matches, according to coach Orville Williams.

"He has an old green canvas hat, something like a baseball cap, that he puts on before every match," explained Williams. "He doesn't take it off until he's ready to walk onto the mat. That's the way we know he's ready to start."

It was fitting that at least one Seneca wrestler won the state crown in his weight division. Williams is chairman of the state tournament, and he is probably more responsible for the growth of the sport in Kentucky in recent years than any other man.

North Hardin captured the team championship easily with 78 points, 26 points better than its nearest competitor, Kentucky School for the Blind. Seneca finished 10th.

North Hardin wrestlers coached by Dan Walker, won state crowns in three of the 12 weight divisions. They were Jay Crawford, 112-pound division; Ed Brandon, 154, and Buz Shelton, 180.

Brandon was named outstanding wrestler in the tournament. He pinned his opponent, Ray Crooker of Boone County, last night. The only other pin in the final round was by teammate Shelton.

Other individual winners from Louisville were: Jim Von Dreele of Westport in the 95-pound division; Dan Dickerson, Kentucky School for the Blind, 120pound division; Larry Crowe, Kentucky School for the Blind, 138; Bob Fehre-bach, Flaget, 145, and Bob Dierson, Trinity, 165.

"Any boy who won a championship can be awfully proud," said Williams. "He had an awful hard road to get there."




